# Artificial Intelligence

rtificial intelligence, or AI for short, seems to be the latest buzzword in society today. As one who has a high level of comfortability with technology, it has been fascinating to see what is possible today.

One of my latest "wow" moments from AI was when a friend of mine showed me a video on YouTube where it took characters from a feature film and then created an original spoof by putting it in a 1990s fashion advertisement. The entire short scene was entirely generated by AI tools, which included the images of the characters, the scripts for the characters, and even the voiceovers. It was a demonstration to me of what is possible with this technology.

However, in light of this video and the countless number of others that have been created with this technology, we must give pause to things like this and begin to ask questions through the eyes of faith. How are we as Christians to regard artificial intelligence? Should it be embraced and used, or avoided altogether?

To answer each of these questions, it will be helpful to make the distinction between ministerial use and magisterial use. Lutheran scholars for centuries have made this distinction with regards to reason, i.e. ministerial use of reason and magisterial use of reason. Taking the last one first, the magisterial use of reason means that reason takes the highest position of authority in the same way that a magistrate, or king, would take. This magisterial use of reason is looked down upon as Lutheran Christians because it means that reason and thinking even supersede Jesus Christ and God's Word. With this perspective, if human reason and God's Word ever came into conflict, human reason would win, and that would mean a violation of the First Commandment.

The ministerial use of reason, on the other hand, is where reason serves the Gospel and the Church at large while remaining in a position subservient to it. Reason and common sense can be used to make arguments as to how to defend the Christian faith in light of opposition. It can be used to help make decisions in the realms of where Scripture has neither commanded nor forbidden (adiaphora). There are many other ways reason and common sense can be used without compromising God or God's Word, letting each remain properly positioned on the top where they should be.

The reason I bring this up is that the same classifications can be applied to any other gift that God has given to us in this world. All gifts have the potential to erroneously eclipse God and His Word in their "usefulness" and "utility." At the same time, all gifts can be used to further serve His Church and help aid in getting the Gospel out.

There are some scary things that AI has brought with respect to theology and faith. Voice-cloning tools could easily be manipulated to replicate the voice of a pastor and make him "say" whatever text is inputted so that pastors could "say" false teachings or any number of other inappropriate things. There is already a "SermonAI" tool that has been flooding my inbox, promising AI-generated sermons as a "time saver." However, this would be at the expense of taking away the pastor's preparation and wrestling with God's Word.

There is also the danger that AI chat services, such as ChatGPT and GPT-4, have such real results that it even begs the question of what is means to be human as these computers get ever closer to exhibiting human reason or emotion. The level of authority with which ChatGPT answers receive on online forums such as Reddit demonstrates that it might not take much for many people to see a theological answer from ChatGPT as higher than the Bible itself. (There already exists an AI Jesus that responds to users' text chat questions.)

For all the great concerns and skepticism I have about artificial intelligence, there are some ways in which it could be useful to serve the church. One way in which I have found a benefit already is with Al voice transcription program called Whisper. It has the ability to provide nearly flawless speech to text services. I have used it to generate sermon transcripts, where we load the sermon section of the live stream and use Al to generate a printed copy of the sermon which can go out in the mail to shut-ins who are unable to watch the live stream or use a DVD (e.g. those living in a nursing home). It will also be helpful in many other use cases for Bible classes, lectures, and more.

So, how do we regard artificial intelligence? It definitely has some potential to be used for the good of sharing the Gospel, but only insofar as it doesn't take the place of God or His Word.

# **Monthly Music Minute for October 2023**

A series in which the music director shares some thoughts about the music coming up in church this month

ctober is here, which means our church year is nearing its end, with Advent somehow only a couple months away! In the meantime, we are in what I like to call the "Fall Festival" season of the church year, when we have lots of events, celebrating Holy Cross Reformation Day, All Saints' Day, and Christ the King Sunday (the last Sunday of the Church Year) in the span of three months. I want to share a little bit about two events we have coming up this month.

On Sun., Oct. 22 at 3PM, we will be hosting our second annual hymn festival! This hymn sing, led by our choir and brass, will be entitled "Into the House of the Lord: Reflecting on Our Christian Faith through the Life and Psalms of David." At this hymn festival, we will recall the story of King David, and we will try to imagine what might have been going through his head as he was writing his psalms. Why did he write Psalm 23? What life event caused him to cry out for forgiveness in Psalm 51?

At this hymn festival we will sing close to a dozen hymns which will reflect on questions like these. Those of you who attended last year's hymn festival know how rewarding an experience like this can be. I encourage you to join us!

One week later, during our normal weekend services, we will be celebrating Reformation Day. You may recall that a few years ago was celebration of the 500th anniversary of the start of the Reformation. The key word there is "start" — because the Reformation wasn't a singular event, but instead a and movement process continued to grow and develop over time. That means that there are more 500th anniversaries coming up! 2023 is no different.

The year 2023 marks the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's Formula Missae, or "Order of Mass and Communion for the Church at Wittenberg." A letter he wrote describing the order of service he was using in Wittenberg, it was celebrated in Latin, with his German Mass being

completed three years later. The letter is significant because it is the first record we have of a Lutheran order of service - so we are essentially celebrating 500 years of Lutheran worship this year!


Luther believed strongly in the promises found in the Divine service, emphasizing that, while the order in Formula Missae is the way his church Wittenberg celebrated Holy Communion, one should be wary of getting too legalistic about the order of service and how ritual is performed, writing,

"We will want to beware, lest we make binding what should be free, or make sinners of those who may do some things differently or omit others. All that matters is that the Words of Institution should be kept intact and that everything should be done by faith."

So on this Reformation Day we will celebrate 500 years of this free, faithfilled worship by doing something a little bit different. We will be using Divine Service Setting Five, our contemporary understanding Luther's Divine Service. All liturgy elements and hymns used will have been composed by Martin Luther and his contemporaries. The Preludes and Postlude will be composed by Johann Bach and Dietrich Sebastian Buxtehude, two of the most important and influential composers of Lutheran Church music in history.

Additionally, I will be Sunday's Adult Bible Study that day as we go through the text of the Formula Missae and see how it forms our worship and what we can learn from it today.

As we continue through our "Fall Festival" season, I hope you can join us for these events! Worship can often feel routine - as it is meant to! This is a good thing. That said, sometimes alternate ways of worship may perhaps help you to think about things a little differently, and so enrich your faith from a little bit of a different perspective. So, I invite you to join us as we continue to grow together! - David Gilson























# STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM


