Caring for a New Pastor

oly Cross will have a new pastor in the future! With Call Day behind us, it is most appropriate to share some information about how our congregation can be specific in showing its care and support for him and his family as he serves here.

Pastors need to be cared for and supported in a variety of ways. Our church body, the LCMS, has devoted a series of websites and articles to this topic at lcms.org/wellness. On its main web page, it breaks down the health and wellness of a pastor into several categories. At the center of all wellness is the reality of baptism, that church workers (as well as all Christians, of course) are a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17) through what God has done in baptism (see Romans 6).

LCMS suggests seven other areas of wellness for pastors and church workers on their "wellness wheel." I would like to briefly describe each of them with some examples of how you can help share your care and support for our new pastor (and your other church workers too!).

- **Relational well-being:** This aspect is related to how a pastor makes friends, how he gets along with other people on a personal level, and how he works in the team ministry setting. Consider asking our new pastor if he is familiar with the St. Louis area or knows anyone in the area. After he has been here for some time, you could also ask him what it is like to work with the rest of the Holy Cross staff.
- Emotional well-being: Sometimes ministry can be challenging as church workers minister to families affected by death, loss, and other tragic situations. Sometimes the emotions of these situations can overflow (even if just a fraction) to church workers themselves, so it is good for church workers to manage these emotions in a healthy way. Plus, church workers are not immune to dealing with loss directly in their own lives. As our new pastor gets settled in, if there is a stretch in which there are many funerals or prayer requests, consider reaching out and asking, how are YOU doing? Or you could ask what our new pastor does to unwind after a stressful and emotional day as pastor.
- **Physical well-being:** If a church worker is not fully healthy, it can hurt the ministry. Church workers should maintain a wholesome diet, regular exercise, and good lifestyle choices. Ask our new pastor what he likes to do for exercise or what some of his favorite home-cooked foods are to get the conversation started.
- **Vocational well-being:** Sometimes church workers can feel as if they are lone rangers, serving and working on their



own as one person versus the world. However, such an attitude can quickly lead to burnout. Church workers need to network with fellow workers and establish a rapport with secular and charitable working professionals (e.g. Christian counselors, non-profit groups, and organizations). Attending regular circuit meetings and district conferences is very important. For the most part, I (Pastor Gimbel) and the Elders will tend to this, but feel free to ask our new pastor how his conferences went once he returns.

• Financial well-being: Many church workers see their careers and service as labors of love. Sometimes that may mean the financial picture can be more challenging for them than if they had a job not in church work. I know many church worker friends

who have struggled for years with educational debt and health care costs (to name a few). I encourage that conversations about potentially sensitive issues of finances to be left to the Elders, to the Called Worker Support Team (CWST), and to me. However, you can still show support through financial gifts from time to time. If a church worker is struggling in this aspect, even a small financial gift might have a bigger impact than you might realize.

- Intellectual well-being: There are always new things to be learned in any field or profession, and ministry is no different. Church workers must continue to learn and be aware of educational resources, books, conferences, and many other things for them to keep their proverbial swords sharp. Ask our new pastor what he has been learning or studying as a pastor.
- Spiritual well-being: This aspect might be the most important. It might seem paradoxical, but even though I am in the Bible preparing for sermons, Bible classes, and many other things, those things don't help me on a personal spiritual level. (Perhaps think of it as "brain faith"). To be spiritually healthy, I need a devotional time in God's Word that is separate and distinct from anything I am doing professionally as a pastor. (Perhaps think of this as "heart faith"). Both aspects are essential for a healthy ministry. Ask our new pastor what he does for his devotional routine, or even ask him for some things he has used that he can recommend to you.

Monthly Music Minute for May 2024

A series in which the music director shares some thoughts about the music coming up in church this month

ay 26 is Trinity Sunday, one of my favorite weeks of the year for hymnody. On this day we get to sing beloved, bold proclamations of faith such as "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name" and "Holy, Holy, Holy." How appropriate it is that we sing boldly on a day where we confess a fundamental truth of who our God is, in trinity and in unity.

One lesser-known but equally bold hymn that we will sing on Trinity Sunday is LSB 604, "I Bind unto Myself Today." This hymn is based on a prayer by St. Patrick, the missionary to Ireland from the 5th-6th century. The prayer itself is known as "St. Patrick's Breastplate." I love this name for the prayer, because it echoes the language of Paul's "Armor of God" passage in Ephesians 6. The first verse reads like this:

> I bind unto myself today The strong name of the Trinity By invocation of the same, The Three in One and One in Three!

Did your mind go to baptism when you read that text? I hope it did. It is in baptism that we are marked with the Trinity. That is why every church service begins with the invocation - in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Our armor, our breastplate, our sure defense against all evils is marked on our head in our baptism, where we are bound to Christ, buried with Him into death that we might be raised with Him, as Paul writes in Romans 6.

St. Patrick's original prayer, 11 lengthy stanzas, is a bit too long to practically be one hymn, and so our hymnal only uses five of these stanzas as its text. Most of these five stanzas begin the same way: "I bind


unto myself." In this hymn we put on our armor, our shield, our confidence. The second stanza binds us to the story of Jesus' ministry. The third binds us to God's hand in and plan for our lives. The fourth binds us to God in times of temptation, and the fifth binds us to Him in eternal praise.

To some degree, it is a shame that all 11 of the original stanzas aren't included, because one of the greatest expressions of faith I have seen in a poem is the eighth stanza, which is not included in the hymn:

> Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me. Christ to win me. Christ to comfort and restore me. Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger, Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

On Confirmation Sunday, May 5, the choir will sing a setting of this stanza. This text is a prayer for Christ to be ever-present - and Christ fulfills that promise, as He so reminded us on the mountain at His ascension: "Surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age." This prayer will serve as encouragement to our confirmands, but also as a reminder to everyone in the pews that day that Jesus is our be-all, our end-all, our complete and utter salvation, our Prophet, our Priest, and our King. We need not fear any evil, because anywhere we look, at any stage of our life, in good and in bad, we have Christ on our side, and we can take great comfort that we are bound to Him forever. - David Gilson


At their May meeting, Grace Guild will finalize a ballot for new officers and plans for their annual dinner out in June.




Food: A meal of pizza, salad, and cookies will be served before the meeting.
