Surprise, Surprise!

Part of me always enjoys this time of year. Many news and media outlets publish a "look back at 2025" list of some sort that highlights some of the year's biggest events and news stories in the last 12 months. I don't know if you have followed any such stories, but I noticed a theme among them. Many of these top stories came as a surprise, when unexpected things happened.

Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost's election as Pope Leo XIV. The fact that we had a new pope is not necessarily surprising, but the big surprise is that there were very few who expected the new resident of Vatican City to call the United States his home.

A Contentious Oval Office Encounter. On February 28, President Donald Trump and Vice President Vance publicly criticized Ukrainian President Zelensky, ending the meeting abruptly and leaving a crucial minerals deal unsigned.

Los Angeles Wildfires. In January, wildfires swept across Los Angeles County, burning nearly 50,000 acres and forcing mass evacuations. There aren't many that would envision such a populated area suffering losses like this one.

The Texas Flooding. Devastating flash floods swept through parts of Texas in early July 2025, following intense rainfall over the Fourth of July weekend. The disaster resulted in more than 120 deaths, with more than 150 adults and children still reported missing in the aftermath.

Other surprises occurred this year. In sports, the Philadelphia Eagles surprisingly dominated the Super Bowl against the Kansas City Chiefs, and we saw the blockbuster trades of Luke Doncic (NBA) and Micah Parsons (NFL). In pop culture, we saw the surprising emergence of things like Labubu, KPop Demon Hunters, and 6/7.

As I looked at this list, it reminded me of the surprises in Scripture. One theme throughout the Bible, as in 2025, is that unexpected things happen to people. This theme is especially prominent in the Gospel

according to Luke. Just look at some of the key parts of Mary's famous song, the Magnificat, in Luke 1:

- Proud people are scattered in their thoughts (v. 51)
- Mighty people on thrones are brought down (v. 52)
- Humble people are exalted (v. 52)
- Hungry people are filled (v. 53)
- Rich people leave empty-handed (v. 53)

This song was a preview for some of the other themes and stories we know so well from Luke, many of them with elements of surprise:

- It was a surprise that our Savior was born in a tiny town in a feeding trough (Luke 2)
- It was a surprise to see that a Samaritan helped the stranger who was beaten and left for dead (Luke 10)
- It was a surprise to see the Prodigal Son's father embrace his son with open arms (Luke 15)
- It was a surprise to see Jesus welcome and eat with a tax collector like Zacchaeus (Luke 17)

Most importantly, though, we are the beneficiaries of such a surprise. We are sinful people who have not even come close to doing everything that God has set for us. And yet the greatest surprise of all is that God still loves us. God surprises us by sending Jesus to save us. We are the beneficiaries of being surprised by the Great Exchange when our sins are swapped out for Jesus' perfect righteousness. God surprises us by giving us WAY more than what we could ask for or deserve with all of the things we have been given in our lives, PLUS the hope of an eternal life in heaven!

It really is surprising when you think about it, isn't it?

Monthly Music Minute

A series in which the music director shares some thoughts about the music coming up in church this month

n a Sunday morning while we're singing a

hymn, you may have heard something that sounds a bit like jingle bells ringing in the back of the organ. I've gotten a couple questions about that: what is that sound, and why does the organ make it? I thought it might be helpful to explain those bells, called the zimbelstern.

The word "zimbelstern" literally translates to "cymbal-star," named because zimbelsterns were traditionally made in the shape of a star with small bells at each point. The zimbelstern is an organ setting that, when engaged, causes the star to rotate, producing a continuous tinkling sound. This is different from most other organ stops, which only sound

when you are actively holding the key down. The zimbelstern operates instead on an on-off switch; that way, it will sound even while the organist is playing other things.

If it is star-shaped, the zimbelstern is often visible on the exterior of the organ case; when it is not visible, but instead placed out of sight with the other pipes (like ours at Holy Cross), it may or may not have a star shape. See the pictures included with the article to see both a star-shaped and a non-star-shaped zimbelstern.

To operate, the star or wheel is turned, either manually or automatically. The bells are either rotated and struck by stationary clappers mounted around the star; or, if the bells are stationary, a rotating device in the center strikes the bells. You may have seen a child of the zimbelstern in a popular Christmas table decoration where candles turn a windmill which strikes small cymbals.

As the zimbelstern has been in existence for hundreds of years, over time some traditions and practices for using the zimbelstern have developed in liturgical contexts. These largely stem from the fact that the bells tend to bring to

mind images of angels or images of heaven,

celestial things, and things from above. So, it has become a standard practice to use the zimbelstern while singing

zimbelstern while singing things that might join us with the choirs of angels in heaven.

Take, for instance, the Sanctus. When we sing the Sanctus, we are singing the very words that the cherubim and seraphim sing in Isaiah chapter 6. We are transported to the banquet hall of heaven in the Lord's Supper. That is why the pastor says "Therefore with angels and archangels..." Since we're singing with the angels, we use the zimbelstern.

Or take, for instance, doxological stanzas — you know, those verses that we stand for with the triangle by them. If you remember the words of the doxology, we sing "Praise Him above, ye heavenly host" — that is, praise Him, all you angels. In praising the Trinity we join again singing with the angels, acknowledging God for who He is, and so we use the zimbelstern.

Since the zimbelstern is usually added to hymns of great triumph and joy, another practice that some organists will follow is to omit its use, even during the Sanctus or doxological stanzas, during the penitential seasons of Advent and Lent. Think of it like the organist omitting his "Alleluia" from worship until Easter, withholding fullest praise until those great festivals.

It's important to remember that these uses of the zimbelstern are not law but tradition; as such, just like with any church tradition, we are free to include more use of the zimbelstern or less. It really doesn't matter much in the grand scheme of things, but, like many of our liturgical practices, hearing the zimbelstern can be a useful tool in helping us focus more intently on what is truly happening in worship.
